THEATRE LE MEDECIN VOLANT/LA JALOUSIE DU BARBOUILLE ***

MELBOURNE French Theatre has been staging French-language plays here for more than three decades. Our culture is richer for it. If quality has varied with the experience of the actors, every so often the company shows us how it should be done.

This double-bill of one-act Moliere plays

The Flying Doctor and The Jealous Husband — roars to life in a nimble, physical
and fabulously funny production. Among
Moliere's earliest, the works draw heavily
on the vulgar caricature and exaggerated
gesture of the commedia dell' arte, doubling as heady experiments in the art of
ridicule he later mastered.

It's likely Mollere felt about doctors the way Shakespeare did about dogs. The rogue-hero of *The Flying Doctor*, Sganarelle (Will Tait), impersonates one to further a love intrigue. His deception neatly skewers the profession: "Hippocrates says, and Galen too, with strong reasoning argues, that a person does not feel well when he is ill."

Tait's performance is hilarious, spicing the satirical dialogue with artificial gins, farcical antics and winning buffoonery. He's no less surefooted in *The Jealous Husband*, playing another pompous medico who solves a raging marital conflict by boring everyone into submission.

A recent arrival with impressive theatrical experience in France, director his Gaillard has a real gift for comedy. Her classical production, in whiteface and period costume, proceeds from deep understanding of the French comic tradition but feels utterly fresh.

With swift pace, sharp wit and elastic, cartoonish absurdity, this is a wonderful introduction to one of the world's great comic dramatists. And if your French is as dodgy as mine, don't stress — there are subtitles.
